EAT YOUR WAY TO BRAIN HEALTH

Inflammation over time can destroy brain cells. Eating these foods fight inflammation: olive oil, green tea and leafy greens (kale, broccoli, spinach, collards). Increased blood flow to the brain promotes neuron growth and these foods can help with that: beets, tomatoes and avocados. Amyloid plaques kill brain neurons --these foods work deep in the brain to fight plaques: nuts, especially walnuts, and pomegranates. The following foods have been found to support the growth of new neurons: fish, blueberries, grapes, coffee and dark chocolate.

Who Cares?

by MELANNIE SVOBODA SND on MARCH 5, 2018

If I am having a really bad day, my mantra becomes, "Who cares?" Here's how it works.

As I am putting on my socks in the morning, I see a hole in the toe and I say, "Who cares?"

When I open the refrigerator door and see we're low on milk, I say, "Who cares?"

When I read the tragic headlines in the morning newspaper, I say, "Who cares?""

When I realize I have fifteen important things on my to-do list for today, I say, "Who cares?"
Years ago psychologists gave a name to this "Who cares?" attitude. They called it "compassion fatigue."
Compassion fatigue occurs when we are so bombarded by needy people, critical situations, and serious issues, we shut down emotionally. Our "Who cares?" is really our way of saying, "I have no more energy to care about a blessed thing!"

Besides being a woman, I am also a Christian and aren't Christians supposed to care about things? And on top of that, I am a nun—and aren't nuns women who, in a way, vow to care—not only about people, but also about every worthy cause under the sun? All of this led me to wondering: did Jesus ever experience compassion fatigue? Perhaps he did. Remember those times when the crowds just wouldn't leave him alone? Or when his disciples were so dense they completely missed the point of his teaching? Or all those times he got more than a little testy with the Pharisees? Or when he was so exhausted he fell asleep in a boat during a violent storm and had to be awakened

Or when, in the Temple one day, he grabbed a whip, flipped over some tables, and chased the money changers out of the place? He probably was experiencing compassion fatigue. Maybe he was even tempted to say (at least under his divine breath) "Who cares?"

When I find myself slipping into the "Who cares?" mood, I know it is time.

Time for what? It is time for me to get some rest to make myself unavailable for a while to talk to God and/or to a good friend about what may *really* be going on in my life to rearrange my priorities.

Again. to humbly acknowledge the fact that I have limits—and I have just reached them to say over and over again: I am *not* the savior of the world. Jesus is! and to pray something like this:

Jesus, everything inside me is screaming, "Who cares?"

But you know, deep in my heart, I really do care.
I care about people, I care about faith,
I care about peace, I care about justice,
I care about today, I care about the future.
I am just overwhelmed right now by all the needs swirling around me.

Give me the common sense to deal with my fatigue.

Give me the humility to acknowledge that I can't do everything.

Give me the strength to know that "sweet bird" has the power to revive my soul. I can do something.

And help me to keep trusting in your unending care for me, for my loved ones, for everyone, and for our beautiful and needy world. Amen.

March 11, 2018

Holy Week

Beginning on Palm Sunday, March 25 at 9am, we enter into the holiest of weeks of the liturgical year. On this day the Church recalls the entrance of Christ the Lord into Jerusalem to accomplish the Paschal Mystery. As such, we will gather outside for the blessing of palms and listen to the Gospel which describes His glorious entrance. We will then process into the church recalling the path that Jesus followed on his entry into Jerusalem.

On <u>Holy Thursday</u>, <u>March 29 at 7pm</u>, we will begin the sacred Easter Triduum, the summit of the liturgical year, from the evening of Holy Thursday to the evening of Easter Sunday. Though chronologically three days, they are liturgically one day unfolding for us the unity of Christ's Paschal Mystery. The single celebration of the Triduum marks the end of the Lenten season. Holy Thursday is celebrated in the remembrance of the Last Supper. It is also the night that we will have the washing of feet, an example of service to one another that Jesus left with the disciples and leaves with us to follow. We will end this liturgy with our procession to the Altar of Repose for prayer and adoration of the Blessed Sacrament, which will be available till midnight.

On Good Friday, March 30 at Noon, we will again walk and pray the Stations of the Cross for our final time this Lent. We will then continue our prayer in the "Reflections from the Foot of the Cross". This brief liturgy is a time to reflect on the events of the crucifixion and how they might relate to our faith journey. At 7pm on Good Friday, we gather for the Celebration of the Passion of the Lord which will include the proclamation of the Passion and the procession and Veneration of the Cross.

The <u>Easter Vigil will be celebrated on Saturday, March 31, at 8pm</u>, the greatest and most noble of all solemnities of the Church. We will welcome <u>Joyce Johnson</u> as a new Catholic and will <u>baptize the grandchild of Elliot and Aquila Clark.</u> This holy night will bring in the new Light of Christ in the Baptismal Candle and we will listen to readings of Salvation History.

On the First Sunday of Lent, Mark's Gospel tells of Jesus being driven to the desert by the Spirit where he remained for forty days, tempted by Satan. We begin our Lenten journey with the theme of "From the Desert to the Cross". You are invited to carry the little cross that you will receive for these forty days as a reminder that we are all walking this journey with Jesus as He travels the road to the Cross. He is our hope and our salvation. Let us listen attentively to the Word of God during this Lenten Season and find the bountiful blessings that are in store for us.

Our Lenten Eucharistic celebrations
will have a 'Call to Worship' in the form
of the sound of the 'rainstick'. This will be
a time to center ourselves, prepare for
worship and think about how we are making this Lent more meaningful for the

Fasting and Abstinence Norms for Lent

Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are obligatory days of fasting and abstinence for Catholics. In addition, Fridays during Lent are obligatory days of abstinence. The norms on fasting are obligatory from age 18 until age 59. When fasting, a person is permitted to eat one full meal, as well as two smaller meals that together are not equal to a full meal. The norms concerning abstinence from meat are binding upon members of the Catholic Church from age 14 onwards. (Serious health issues must always be considered)
