

Reflection from Sr. Helen Flemington

Great people always have a way of seeing things that most others, at first, cannot see in the same way. People like Gandhi, Mother Teresa, and Martin Luther King Jr. saw things that others did not, at first, see. Only gradually were their followers able to adopt the same vision as these great people. When they did, it made a tremendous difference in the lives of thousands of people. There has not been a greater person than Jesus Christ himself. He saw so many things that others were unable to see. As his followers, we are asked to share his vision of life. Today's Gospel gives us an important piece of Jesus' vision.

In the Parable of the Unjust Steward, the main message is the wise use of possessions, rather, his prudence in taking stock of his situation using his business cleverness, and acting decisively. Jesus strongly presses his point: "What I say to you is this: Make friends for yourselves through your use of this world's goods, so that when they fail you, a lasting reception will be yours". To dispose of worldly wealth in the proper was is to gain the friendship of God.

In the nineteenth century an American tourist visited the Polish rabbi, Hofetz Chaim: Astonished to see that the rabbi's home was only a simple room filled with books, plus a table and a bench, the tourist asked, "Rabbi, where is your furniture?" "Where is yours?" replied the rabbi. "Mine?" asked the puzzled American. "But I'm a visitor here. I'm only passing through." "So am I," said Hofetz Chaim.

May God grant us such a beautiful and freeing attitude to all that we possess.

Health Corner: Adult Immunizations



Because there have been several Pertussis (whooping cough) outbreaks across the USA in the last years the Kansas City Health Dept. highly encourages ALL ADULTS--especially those who at any time are around children, this includes your own children, grandchildren, baby sitting, etc.

to get a Tdap shot (tetanus, diphtheria and pertussis (whooping cough). The reason for this is that in the past couple of years there have been several outbreaks of whooping cough. In California 10 babies died from whooping cough in one year alone. If an adult has pertussis/whooping cough they do not have the cough that whoops, but they do have a sever cough that lasts a long time. Only children that have pertussis actually "whoop" when they cough. As with many air borne diseases you are contagious before you are aware of being ill. Thus, all adults, 18 and older, should have the Tdap shot so they do not give whooping cough to babies who can die from this disease. Do it now so you can protect the children around you.
