Andrea is really serious thank goodness, about following safety measures! Anna and I are well and safe in Florida. Please pray for all of us as we pray for all of you. Love to all -sending our best!

Mike and Diana Burdett: We are very blessed during quarantine. We don't have to work and we are pretty much homebodies anyway and both girls are still at home. Audrey is in a really good place right now. She is happier than I have seen her since high school. Sadly, Jo still has to go to her job, but they started doing one week on and one week off, plus they are paying them 20% more an hour for hazard pay. So there is some good, but she has to touch money, which would be gross. I had a nice birthday last week. I did a Zoom meeting with my fellow lunch ladies, Audrey made us French toast, and Jo made a cake and steak for dinner. So fancy! I have gotten a LOT of projects done. One day I will have a massive load for the thrift store. But that will have to wait for awhile. I am thinking this may go on longer than just April. I worry about people. These are some very scary times but I see a lot of help being offered too.

Karlinta McKeever: We are locked down too and attempting to take every precaution to ensure Quinn doesn't get sick. He and Zane are all over each other the way brothers do but overall everything is going ok. I have been having a difficult time not going down to see my mom while this quarantine is happening. I am also managing her household and renovation work from here so it has been a bit crazy. In good news I am almost done with my Master's at Avila and hopefully I will be able to have a safe back-up plan in case I get laid off from the new T-Mobile. We don't know much about the changes yet but considering the state of the world it couldn't have come at a more precarious time.

Tim & Netty Doyle: Tim and I are doing well. Tim is still working and being safe. Bread is an essential item these days. He is busy checking on his parents and getting ready for the golf season that may never happen. Poor guy. I am going stir crazy. It's taken a week and I'm not at the end of my places. This has been so much fun! I also watch Mass on YouTube with the Rockhurst Jesuits. I'm ever mindful of the health care people and first responders who are putting their lives on the line, for the teachers, children and parents who have to adjust to a new way of education, for the homeless, for all of the people who are losing income. All in all, the days have been going well and the newness hasn't worn off, but we have a long road ahead before getting back to whatever normal will be. Blessings to everyone!
