## Weekly Reflection on God's Word

Job 38:1,8-11 Psalm 107:23-24,25-26,28-29,30-31 2 Corinthians 5:14-17 Mark 4:35-41

As we continue in Ordinary Time, we hear from the Gospel of Mark. Mark's Gospel presents a vivid portrait of Jesus, whose words and deeds show that he is the Son of God. Today's Gospel describes the end of a day of teaching in Jesus' ministry. Jesus taught the crowd in parables and then offered explanations of these parables to his disciples. Jesus then led his disciples away from the crowds and into the boats that they will use to cross the Sea of Galilee. The sea and its surrounding area are the settings for Jesus' teachings and miracles in this part of Mark's Gospel. Today's reading describes how Jesus calmed a storm at sea. It is the first of four miracles that are presented in sequence at this point in Mark.

As is typical in Mark's Gospel, Jesus' disciples are frightened by the sudden storm; they do little to inspire confidence in the reader. Mark notes the contrast between the disciples' terror and Jesus' peace. Jesus is sleeping, untroubled by what is going on around him.

The disciples' words to Jesus are telling. They are familiar enough with Jesus to dare to wake him. Their words to him are words of reproach, questioning his care for them. A careful reader might wonder what the disciples expected Jesus to do. Are they more troubled by the storm or by Jesus' inattentiveness to their needs? How many of us have chided a family member or friend for not agreeing with our assessment of the severity of a situation?

Today's Gospel offers evidence of Jesus' power and authority as he calms the storm. In his day, power over nature was believed to be a sign of divinity—only God calms storms. Jesus' rebuke of the storm also echoes the rebuke he uses when he talks to and expels demons. In each situation, Jesus' power and authority is a sign of his divinity. Indeed, the disciples are left wondering about Jesus' identity at the conclusion of today's Gospel. They see before them a human being who acts with the authority and power of God. The disciples' uncertainty about Jesus' identity is a recurring theme.

This Gospel is a metaphor for our lives. We are in the boat, the storms of life are raging around us, and like the disciples, we may believe that Jesus is unconcerned, or "sleeping." We hope that we will be as familiar with Jesus as his disciples. If we feel that Jesus is sleeping, are we comfortable enough to wake Jesus and present him with our needs? Jesus does not chide his disciples for waking him. Instead he chides them for their lack of faith, for their lack of perspective. When we bring our worries to God in prayer, we might just begin to learn to see things from God's perspective.

# Five Fast Questions with Generosity of Joseph Honoree Fr. Gerald Waris



Get to know a little bit about one of our four honorees, Fr. Gerald Waris. A retired priest, Fr. Waris recognizes and defends the human dignity as well as promotes justice for the poor in the Kansas City area. He's a founding member of Journey to New Life, an organization that restores opportunity for those re-entering life after prison. Also, for several decades, he's been an active volunteer and supporter of the Center for Exchange and Solidarity in El Salvador, which is dedicated to the advancement of education and social justice.

What is your connection to the CSJs? In 1966, I was ordained a deacon and assigned to St. Joseph's Hospital as assistant chaplain. I lived at the hospital and spent three months working as chaplain. It was a delightful time, which I enjoyed very much. I was introduced to the staff of the hospital, many of whom were Sisters of St Joseph. I was so impressed with their dedication to vocation, not only to religious life, but to their vocation as nurses. Several to this day remain good friends.

What's one thing you want people to know about the people you serve? Our benefactors and those who have come to support our mission in many ways have witnessed firsthand the transition that has taken place among our friends who have come to us for help and a new beginning. I hesitate to call the folks clients; we see them as brothers/ sisters just trying to find their way to a new life. The eye opener for those learning about our mission is that the rate of success is 93%. With God's help, we have been able to encourage our friends to be faithful to the program.

Who inspires/energizes you to do what you do? My parents for sure. They taught me and my siblings to have a love of the poor, that no one should go hungry. Oscar Romero the saint, among many, of El Salvador. I have prayed at his tomb, knelt on the floor where his blood spilled over after the bullet was fired. He has inspired me to be faithful to my commitment to be with the people of El Salvador.

**Favorite quote?** William Yeats was asked to describe an Irishman: "An Irishman has an abiding sense of tragedy, which sustains him in his temporary moments of joy."

If you could change one thing in the world right now, what would it be? To ban all assault weapons in this country and have strict gun control laws.



# Sickle-Cell Anemia Blood Donation



Sickle-cell anemia is an inherited blood disorder that causes anemia (low red blood cell count), episodes of severe pain, low resistance to infections and



chronic poor health. In this disorder the red blood cells are sickle shaped instead of round. They thus tend to clump together and obstruct blood vessels. It involves the bone marrow, lymph glands, spleen, liver and thymus gland. It usually begins around the age of 6 months of age and lasts for a life time.

The disease is hereditary: if <u>both parents</u> carry the sickle-cell trait then the child can have Sickle-Cell Disease. Those who have only the trait will never get the disease but if they have a child with someone who also has the trait then the child may have the disease.

Sickle-cell is most often found in people of African or Mediterranean decent. It is incurable and life expectancy is reduced. Before having children, both parents should be tested for sickle-cell trait if there is any history of sickle-cell in either family. Fortunately, life span has gradually increased to over 40 years of age with increasingly effective treatments.






