Bishop Johnston described the process as a way to "honestly assess our needs as a diocese and align them to the larger call of living as households of faith united in one Church as disciples of Jesus Christ."



Tips for Success:

- ◆ Keep a medicine record
- Make your own list of medicines by keeping a medicine record that includes:
- ♦ Name of medicine *** What it is for *** Name of doctor who prescribed it
- ♦ How and when to take it *** How much to take (dosage) *** Color/Shape of medicine
- ♦ Any side effects or warnings *** Talk to your doctor
- ♦ It's important to get in the habit of asking your doctor questions about your medications.
- Keep up with your medicines
- Keep medications in plain sight, in a cool dry place.

Reflection on

Today's Gospel ...

Here we are in mid-summer. Vacation calls for big decisions: where to go, what to do, and the thorniest problem of all, what to

pack for the trip. Serendipitously, for the next two weeks our Gospel readings are in sync with summer as we hear about the disciples' first mission journey and then see how plans change for Jesus when he seeks a get-away day. Although they aren't really "vacation" stories, the comparison can be fruitful.

When Jesus sends the 12 out on mission (Mark 6:7-13), his instructions are as explicit as they are puzzling. To begin with, Jesus bestows his own authority on the disciples. Just like him, they have the power to heal and overcome demons. But before they can begin to practice their new powers, Jesus unpacks their bags so that they will travel in his style.

Listen carefully to Jesus' instructions. The disciples are to set out with nothing except a walking stick and sandals, the same clothing that was prescribed for the first Passover. Jesus is sending them on an Exodus. But, unlike the Israelites who took everything they could carry from the Egyptians, Jesus tells his disciples to take nothing - not even food or cash.

What's going on here? Jesus gave the disciples immense power and then immediately ordered them not to rely on their own resources. Why did he want them to choose poverty as their equipment for mission? When we think of the difficulties of a foot journey away from home and through bandit-ridden territory, we might wonder if Jesus was setting them up. The only security he gave them was to send them in pairs.

In Jesus' mind, that unique combination of power and voluntary poverty was indispensable to their mission. Although they had something enormously valuable to offer, they couldn't accomplish their task without becoming dependent on the gifts of others.

In truth, Jesus was setting them up. He was setting them up to learn the meaning of the very message they were goup to learn the meaning of the very message they were going out to preach. And, upon their return, they got a second a member of the Sisters of St. Joseph of Carondelet installment in the lesson.

In today's Gospel, we see that Jesus has grown in popularity while the disciples were out on their mission. So many people were seeking him that there wasn't even time to eat. In addition, the newly returned disciples wanted to talk about their success. They had healed! They had defeated demons! They were becoming famous like Jesus! Jesus knew that such achievements could be extremely dangerous. It was time to take a break - and we all know what happened to those plans. The crowd played right into Jesus' hands and the failed get-away became part two in the disciples' course on evangelization.

Mark explains it so simply that we could miss the point: "When ... he saw the vast crowd, his heart was moved with pity." Unfortunately, our English translation fails to convey the richness of Mark's original writing. What English translates as "heart" is the word used for "womb." Mark is explaining that the crowd moved Jesus from his innermost center. And what did he feel? A better word than "pity" would probably be "compassion." Compassion suggests "feeling with" rather than the superiority implied by "pity." Mark is telling us that Jesus got caught by the crowd in a double sense. Not only did they find him, but he so identified with them that their need became his own. He began to teach them, and, before the day would end, they would experience the miracle of the sharing of the bread of life.

All together, today's readings have a lot to say about our life's mission. They suggest that rather than pack our bags for self-sufficiency, we might well take time to discover how we have received "every spiritual blessing in the heavens" (Ephesians 1). Knowing the source of our blessings and power will allow us to see what others have to offer us as well. These readings also remind us that we are a people chosen for a mission beyond the comfort of our own territory. We are missioned to learn compassion with others from whom we "were once far off" with whom we can become one.

The timing of these readings is serendipitous. They urge us to take a summer break and go beyond our ordinary experience. Whether we head out on a special mission journey, a vacation or just a get-away day, these Scriptures suggest that this is a great time to reflect on the mission journey that is our Christian vocation.

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


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
